"International Sisters Day". Marked every year since 1996 on the first weekend in August, it honours a potent vitality that helps enable women as they innovate and inspire and otherwise enrich our daily lives.

The work is fully funded and promises decades — at least — of longevity, as bronze is the gold standard for outdoor sculptures.

The applicants will hire structural engineers to properly design the sculpture's concrete base, and contractors to build same — while also installing the artwork itself.

The applicants are confident Windsor residents will find "Three Sisters" to be a worthwhile and gratifying addition to the city's artistic landscape.

MINUTES MUSEUM CAPITAL RESERVE FUND COMMITTEE (Facility Committee) Thursday, April 25, 2024 9:30 o'clock a.m. Francois Baby House, 254 Pitt Street West

A meeting of the Museum Capital Reserve Fund Committee (Facility Committee) is held this day commencing at 9:30 o'clock a.m. at the François Baby House, 254 Pitt Street West, there being present the following members:

(It being noted that the Facility Committee is set up as item 2.2 of the Use Agreement between the Corporation of the City of Windsor and Windsor Historic Sites Association, which states that this committee is comprised of 2 nominees of the city and 3 nominees of the WHSA)

1. CALL TO ORDER

Acting Chair D. Wilson called the meeting to order at 9:30 o'clock a.m.

2. DECLARATION OF CONFLICT

None declared.

3. MINUTES

Moved by M. Staadegaard, seconded by D. Wilson
That the minutes of the Museum Capital Reserve Fund Committee (Facility
Committee) held Thursday, January 18, 2024 meeting BE ADOPTED as written.

Carried

4. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

4.1 Financial update on museum capital reserve fund (Museum Structural and Capital Improvements Fund 182)

M. Della Valle notes that there is, as of March 16, 2024 a sum of \$156,063.75 in this fund.

M. Staadegaard noted the following:

- According to the 2007 Use Agreement between the Corporation of the City of Windsor and Windsor Historic Sites Association, Section 2.1 Capital Reserve Fund, the annual sum paid into the Capital Reserve Fund by the City of Windsor should equal 2% of the insurable value of the Francois Baby House, exclusive of contents.
- In 2007, the insurable value of the Francois Baby House was \$802,000
- According to the Agreement, the insurable value of the Francois Baby House shall be re-evaluated every 5th year, and thus the annual sum should have increased every 5th year. However, the re-evaluation and increase in the annual sum has not occurred since the inception of this agreement in 2007.
- In consultation with the FPA we have confirmed the following: The total insurable value of the Francois Baby House as of 2022 is \$1,100,488.37. In 2024, the updated reserve contribution based on 2022 insurable value would be \$22,009.77. This will mean an increase to the reserve fund moving forward starting in 2024 of \$5,969.77
- Based on the evaluation every 5th year the next increase would be in 2028 based on the 2027 evaluation

Moved by G. Manias, seconded by D. Wilson:

Taking in consideration the requirement that the Francois Baby House have its insurable value updated every 5th year, and also that the annual sum paid into the Capital Reserve Fund by the City of Windsor should equal 2% of the insurable value of the Francois Baby as outlined in the 2007 Use Agreement between the Corporation of the City of Windsor and Windsor Historic Sites Association, that this requirement be brought forward every 5th year to Windsor City Council (for information only) beginning in 2028 based on the 2027 evaluation in order to ensure the required increase to the transfer to the Museum Structural and Capital Improvements Fund 182 is implemented.

Carried.

4.2 Jesuit Pear trees

M. Della Valle noted that there is no update as we are waiting for spring to obtain Jesuit Pear seedlings.

4.3 A/C cage

K. Dufour said the fabrication of the cage to be installed (behind the outbuilding) is currently taking place, and likely to be installed in the spring. He will follow up.

4.4 Security cameras, lights, security system, security concerns

M. Della Valle noted that the new security cameras were installed between February 29th and March 6th, 2024 and are in good working order.

She also noted that there have been less incidents of problematic social behaviour on the property in the last couple of months.

4.5 Further securing Hiram Walker Historical Museum Plaque

D. Wilson inquired as to the reversibility of the proposed adhesive (Red Head A7+ All Weather Concrete Masonry Adhesive) K. Dufour will follow up on this question prior to application.

4.6 More Storage Space for Artifacts Needed

D. Wilson noted that there has been no response as of yet to the letter that L. Nazarewich sent on behalf of the Windsor Historic Sites Association to Windsor Public Library Acting CEO Michael Chantler (with copy to the Windsor Public Library Board, and the City Clerk's office) supporting the possibility of having some storage space in a future library building. D. Wilson will follow up with some correspondence asking for a confirmation that they have received the letter.

4.7 Leaking in "Fort" (underground storage area)

M. Della Valle noted that small amounts of water are still coming into the fort artifact storage area near the base of the west stairs (which lead to the shack on the patio). She noted that water pools at the south wall of the shack which is likely worsening the leaking problem. K. Dufour will look into getting a company to lift concrete in order to redirect the water flow away from that section of the patio.

M. Della Valle also noted that salt efflorescence is still occurring in the east stairwell, particularly on the west side. She is suspecting further water infiltration. K. Dufour will investigate.

5. NEW BUSINESS

5.1 Update on the fence on the east side of FBH.

M. Della Valle noted that St. Clair College installed on April 3, 2024 yellow visibility posts/fence segments at the north end of the fence, replacing previously frequently backed-into segment of the wood fence alongside their loading dock.

5.2 Building Condition Assessment

M. Della Valle noted that the City of Windsor has hired a consultant to perform a building condition assessment on the Francois Baby House. They will be onsite on May 15th, 2024. The committee requested that a follow up report be obtained from the consultant.

Collections Management/Artifact Acquisition

Two (2) acquisitions committee meeting were held, and newly collected artifacts and images are currently being accessioned.

Canada Summer Job grant enabled digitization of index cards, and photography of artifacts to be eventually uploaded to Mimsy and MWeb (for better public access to collections)

Young Canada Works grant resulted in numbering of the education collection, and research on Indigenous articles in early newspapers from the region.

Digital Strategy for Museum Windsor created

Purchase underway of gold topped ebony walking/swagger stick presented to Mayor Donald Cameron, inscribed with the following: "Presented to Donald Cameron, Esq From the citizens of Windsor July 4 1887"

Museum has been working a major project to capture, for the future, elements of the current pandemic. These are being catalogued into the museum's permanent collection.







This objective must be balanced with the need to preserve the integrity of heritage buildings as artifacts themselves, as well as archaeological resources present on the property.

Health & Safety

The City of Windsor, is committed to ensuring the health & safety of its employees, its patrons and those contracted to do work for the City, and to the prevention of occupational injuries and illnesses.

The Museum is aware of the numerous federal, provincial and municipal legislations that affect its day-to-day operations and help to ensure the physical safety of visitors, staff and property. All museum staff, full & part-time, are trained in safety procedures in keeping with the Ontario Health & Safety Act and Regulations, the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act and The City of Windsor's Healthy Workplace Policy. As a municipally operated museum, the site is routinely inspected for maintenance concerns, both inside and out by City staff.

Maintaining Environmental Controls

An adequate and regularly inspected and maintained HVAC and security system is essential at all Museum Windsor sites. The City of Windsor facilities department is responsible for providing this service at the Francois Baby House and the Chimczuk Museum. The Ontario Heritage Trust is responsible for providing this service at the Duff Baby House.

Museum staff monitor/record both temperature and relative humidity conditions using an environmental data logger to help maintain a reasonably constant environment for the collection and items on exhibit.

Lighting levels are also monitored to provide safe & limited lighting for artifacts on exhibition and UV filters have been installed on all fluorescent lighting. Regular monthly inspections are also conducted throughout the facility to monitor and take action against any possible pest or vermin.

Emergency Plan

The City of Windsor Emergency Response plan is designed to make provisions for extraordinary arrangements and measures that may have to be taken to protect the property, health, safety and welfare of our city's inhabitants when faced with an emergency. In the City's plan, individual responsibilities were assigned to specific Municipal Services, such as Fire, Police, Public Health, Public Works and Social Services. The Museum will follow the guidelines as set out in the City's plan with a Museum Specific guide.

The Museum is responsible for the care and the preservation of the artifacts & archival material in its collection, entrusted to it by the community. It will provide for the best possible physical environment, preventive maintenance program and conservation services to meet this responsibility as outlined in the *Collections Management Policy*, for both collection storage & exhibitions.

Community Involvement & Role in the Community

The Museum is committed to offering a variety of scheduled exhibits, events, programs and volunteer opportunities to the public throughout the year that are consistent with the *Mission Statement*.



Hockey

A travelling exhibition developed by the Canadian Museum of History February 8th, to May 4th 2025.

The sport of hockey is coming to the Chimczuk Museum this February. Created by the Canadian Museum of History, visitors to the Chimczuk are invited to explore the history and evolution of the sport.

The sweat-soaked smell of the locker room. The flick of the wrist-shot. The scream of the enthusiastic fans. For millions of Canadians, winter is synonymous with hockey — a sport integral to Canadian society. Hockey brings us together. It thrills us. It is part of our identity, our shared history. It is a passion handed down from generation to generation, a recreational activity, and a commercial

enterprise.



This one-of-a-kind travelling exhibition offers visitors an exciting interactive experience showcasing high points in the sport from both yesterday and today. This engaging exhibition explores the importance and influence of hockey over the past 100 years, and brings the history of the sport to life through profiles of participants at both the professional and amateur levels.

It is presented in a series of graphic panels using photographs and reproduction of key artifacts, memorabilia and works of art. Also included are audio archives and an audio-visual interactive where visitors can record their own running commentary of a portion of a hockey match.

Victim Witness Screen

Developed in 1988 following new legislation to protect vulnerable witnesses, the Victim Witness Screen was conceived by court administrator Mara Conrad. Drawing on the principle of a two-way mirror, it allows the witness to see out while preventing those in the courtroom from seeing the witness. Ms. Conrad partnered with Mr. **Guy Hamel of In'Flector Control Systems** Inc. (known for solar panels) to engineer a portable, lightweight alternative to traditional mirrored glass. After testing the design at various angles to accommodate different statures, they confirmed its effectiveness.



Commissioned by the Attorney General's Head Office in Toronto, 56 screens were produced for courts across Ontario. The first was used in Windsor, where it remained in service for decades. Its success led other provinces to inquire about adopting the "Windsor" victim screen. Although modern courts have shifted to floor-mounted models, this original screen serves as a pivotal innovation in courtroom safety.



The Fabric of Our Being By Nadine Williams

January 1st to March 31st 2025, Chimczuk Museum


Museum Windsor is excited to announce the opening of a new installation, "The Fabric of Our Being," on display now at the Chimczuk Museum. Conceptualized and birthed by Poet and Author, Nadine Williams and her Collective, "The Fabric of Our Being" seeks to bring awareness and celebration to the United Nations proclamation of the International Decade for People of African Descent (2015-2024). A second decade for people of African descent was proclaimed by the UN in December and adopted by Canada (Jan. 2025-Dec. 2034).

Nadine Williams is a Jamaican-Canadian who was born in the Parish of St. Mary and now calls Ontario home. She has published three collections of poetry, two children's books, and over fifteen volumes of literature for Black History Month. These creations are a staple in the curricula of several schools in Canada in celebration of Black History.

She is the recipient of the CIC Volunteer Award 2012, York Regional Police Deeds Speak Award 2014, received parliamentary mention for significant contribution to Black History in Canada in 2019, was named among the 100 Accomplished Black Canadian Women (100ABC) 2022 and have received numerous certificates from all levels of government, including three in the last few months in 2023. Nadine has exhibited her artwork at Canadian Museum of History.

This distinguished President's Poet has opened for former First Lady Mrs. Michelle Obama, The Right Honourable Michaëlle Jean - Canada's former Governor General, Hon. Justin Trudeau, PM of Canada, and Hon. Portia Simpson-Miller - PM of Jamaica. Her current project is to bring awareness to The UN's International Decade for People of African Descent (IDPAD) through her Art installation project, "The Fabric of Our Being!" The Fabric of Our Being will be on display at the Chimczuk Museum until March 31st, 2025.





The Witness Benket

June 2025 – September 2025

Museum Windsor is honoured to announce that starting in June the Chimczuk Museum will be hosting the Witness Blanket on loan from the Canadian Museum for Human Rights.

The Witness Blanket is a powerful art installation created by master carver Carey Newman to recognize the atrocities of the residential school era, honour the children and symbolize ongoing reconciliation. Inspired by a woven blanket, this cedarframed artwork is made of hundreds of items from residential schools, Survivors, churches, governments and other cultural sites across Canada. Traditionally, blankets are meant to protect the young and comfort elders. Each piece of history that took its place on the Blanket is a silent witness to some part of this story.





Newman, whose traditional name is Hayalthkin'geme, is a multi-disciplinary artist, carver, filmmaker, author and public speaker. Through his father, he is Kwakwaka'wakw from the Kukwakam, Gixsam, and Wawałaba'yi clans of northern Vancouver Island, and Coast Salish from Xwchiyò:m (Cheam) of the Stó:lō S'olh Temexw (traditional territories) along the upper Fraser Valley. On his mother's side of the family, his ancestors are English, Irish, and Scottish Settlers. In his artistic practice he strives to highlight Indigenous, social, and environmental issues as he examines the impacts of colonialism and capitalism, harnessing the power of material truth to unearth memory and trigger the necessary emotion to drive positive change.



A Snapshot of the Literary History of the Windsor Region Curated by Marty Gervais April 5th to October 26th, 2025

Travellers and former slaves, teachers and city clerks, along with poets and farmers and journalists and cartoonists, have been spinning stories about this region along the Detroit River since the 19th century. Their astonishing tales, collected in journals, newspapers, magazines and published books reflect the cultural evolution of a community that has always struggled with its own identity in the shadow of its northern neighbour, Detroit. This exhibition, organized by Windsor's Poet Laureate Emeritus Marty Gervais, traces that chronology of what he calls "a gallery of heroes."

It begins with the early sketches and travel diary accounts of steamship traveller Anna Brownwell Jameson, followed by the work of abolitionist Mary Ann Shadd Cary - the first female African American newspaper editor in North America. From there, this gallery stretches from 1865 with Windson's first magistrate writing in his diary about joining thousands in the streets of Detroit to mark the tragic loss of President Abraham Lincoln, to the 20th and 21st centuries with such famous literary luminaries as Marshall McLuhan, Joyce Carol Oates, W.O. Mitchell, Adele Wiseman, Morley Callaghan and Alistair MacLeod.

The exhibit also charts the rise of the city's literary magazines and publishing companies; some garnering such prestigious awards as the Governor General's Award, the Trillium Book Award and the Giller Prize. Our writers soon found themselves featured regularly on the national news and in the pages of the New York Times. And our poets were welcomed annually at the legendary Shakespeare & Company Bookstore in Paris to read on Canada Day. Windsor quickly became host to some of the largest literary readings in the country. This exhibit is a snapshot that champions the words of this gallery of storytellers who chose this side of the river to make their voices heard.



1. CALL TO ORDER

Acting Chair M. Della Valle called the meeting to order at 11 o'clock a.m.

2. DECLARATION OF CONFLICT

3. MINUTES

4. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

4.1 Financial update on museum capital reserve fund (Museum Structural and Capital Improvements Fund 182)

M. Della Valle notes that there is, as of December 31, 2024 a sum of \$181,372.74 in this fund.

4.2 Jesuit Pear trees

M. Della Valle noted that horticulture has thus far been unable to propagate Jesuit pear trees. Madelyn will reach out again to Mike Murphy to inquire again. D. Wilson says that Les Amis Duff-Bâby will also reach out.

4.3 A/C cage

K. Dufour said the fabrication of the cage to be installed (behind the outbuilding) is complete.

4.4 Security system, security concerns

K. Dufour says he has requested a quote from Phillips to replace the existing alarm system at the Francois Baby House.

M. Della Valle reported on graffiti (and other noxious substances) cleaned up on the north porch. She also noted that the south facing window on the east was broken by someone throwing a rock through it. It was broken March 6, 2025 and repaired March 13, 2025. Note that the storm window behind the main window is still broken due to the fact that it is impossible to repair from the outside and the inside access is blocked by exhibition panels.

K. Dufour also noted that Paladin stationed at Adventure Bay and the aquatic centre can be called to the Francois Baby House for assistance, if necessary.

4.5 Further securing Hiram Walker Historical Museum Plaque

The committee requested that M. Della Valle resend the information on the substance proposed to caulk the edges of the plaque in order to secure it. M. Della Valle found that in the minutes of the committee dated November 24, 2021 there was the following:

Moved by D. Wilson, seconded by M. Staadegaard

That the suggestion to caulk the fillable edge around the historic Hiram Walker Historical Museum plaque on the west side of the south entrance of the Francois Baby House with Red Head A7+ All Weather Concrete Masonry Adhesive BE CARRIED OUT, the cost not to exceed \$200.

M. Della Valle found the brochure for Red Head A7+ and is sending it to K. Dufour. Also, still to be determined is the reversibility of the proposed adhesive (Red

Head A7+ All Weather Concrete Masonry Adhesive) K. Dufour will follow up on this question prior to application.

4.6 More Storage Space for Artifacts Needed

D. Wilson noted that there has been no response as of yet to the letter that L. Nazarewich sent on behalf of the Windsor Historic Sites Association to Windsor Public Library Acting CEO Michael Chantler (with copy to the Windsor Public Library Board, and the City Clerk's office) supporting the possibility of having some storage space in a future library building. D. Wilson noted that he still needs to follow up with some correspondence asking for a confirmation that they have received the letter, noting that J. Knights is now the CEO of the WPL, and the Michael Chantler is now Commissioner of Community Services for the Corporation.

Although T. Tang was not able to attend this meeting, she did send some relevant notes to this issue:

I see that Business Item **4.6** "Requirement for Additional Artifact Storage Space" is on the agenda. I have attached the 2024 WAMP adoption Council Resolution CR 333/2024 (on Page 3/5 of the PDF) for reference (this information is copy pasted below the chart), and I am including a copy-paste of Kristina Tang's notes below:
